

Her latest book Ash on Wind is an exquisite volume of poems that share with unflinching honesty the intimacies of personal and familial grieving and childhood trauma. Yet it also explores with humor and astute observation such diverse subjects as the dilemma of how best to care for aging

parents, the poet's fraught relationship with her muse, and the bizarre instructions on the preparation and cooking of such unappetizing wild animals as woodchuck, opossum, raccoon, squirrel.

and laugh through the tears when a father keeps asking "When do I get my car?" and the mother with Alzheimer's, moved to a new room, marvels "Why this furniture is exactly like mine." Her poems memorialize an unborn child, give us insight into the workings of a loving family and explore the trauma of divorce. On her words the reader is transported to Cambodia, Wales, the Bahamas, and a rural town in lowa.

Sandra is the recipient of Prairie Schooner's Hugh J. Luke Poetry Prize. Her poems have been published and won awards in a myriad of literary journals and anthologies, attesting to the breadth of her subject matter and the depth of her ability to make language dance to her versatile drumbeat.
